

A WORD FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Patrons, Supporters, and Friends of the Washington County Free Library,

This past year at the Washington County Free Library has been one of growth, connection, and community. More people than ever are turning to the library as a place to learn, explore, and gather: visits rose by 10% from FY24 to FY25, and circulation of materials increased by 10.6%. Each visit, each book borrowed, is a reminder of the vital role the library plays in the lives of our residents.

Making the library accessible to everyone is at the heart of what we do. This year we increased remote locker capacity in the North End and opened a new location in the South End of Hagerstown, giving residents more convenient access to the materials they need, when they need them. Our Outreach Services provided more events outside of library branches in the spirit of the library's first Director, Mary Titcomb who famously said: bring the books to the reader.

We've also expanded the ways we support lifelong learning. Adult programs grew by 18%, offering everything from homesteading and gardening workshops to low-waste and classes focused on self-reliance. These programs provide practical knowledge that helps residents thrive at home and in their communities, demonstrating that the library is more than books: it's a place to build skills and confidence.

Our commitment to children and young learners continues to grow. Public school students benefit from RAIL cards, which allow them to use their school ID to access library resources, while homeschool families enjoy robust programming designed to inspire curiosity and learning beyond their classroom.

The library's role in fostering community goes beyond education. This year, families came together through Community Baby Showers, in partnership with the Washington County Health Department, in Hancock, Clear Spring, and Williamsport, providing essential supplies to new parents. Our long-standing partnership with Books for Babies ensures that every child born in Washington County receives a book and early literacy resources, giving them a strong start in life.

From helping families grow to teaching skills that strengthen independence, the past year has shown how much our community can accomplish when we support each other. We are grateful to our staff, partners, and patrons whose dedication and enthusiasm make the library a place where everyone belongs, learns, and thrives.






CIRCULATION BY FORMAT

DIGITAL RESOURCES

Patrons enjoyed expanded access to a wide range of digital resources, including Blackstone Unlimited, Libby (OverDrive), Hoopla, Kanopy, and Comics Plus. These platforms provide convenient, 24/7 access to audiobooks, eBooks, movies, music, and comics, allowing users to explore and enjoy the library's collection anytime, anywhere. This continued investment in digital services supports lifelong learning, entertainment, and accessibility for all members of our community.





ACCESS & ACCESSIBILITY

Washington County Free Library is dedicated to providing life-changing services and resources to all members of the community. Building on the success of our North Pointe smart locker system, FY25 saw expansion with the installation of an additional smart locker system at the South Pointe Shopping Center and the introduction of automatic renewals. Smart locker checkouts nearly doubled, increasing from 5,140 to over 10,152. Automatic renewals have made borrowing easier and more convenient for our users, reducing late fees, saving staff time, and allowing patrons to keep their items longer without worrying about due dates.

In an effort to close the digital divide and increase digital literacy across Washington County, the Washington County Free Library distributed no-cost Chromebooks to local households through a grant provided by the Washington County Government via the Maryland State Department of Housing and Community Development. In FY25, the program concluded with a total of 5,250 Chromebooks distributed across every jurisdiction in the county.







ACCESS TO INTERNET CONNECTIVITY

According to the 2020 Census, approximately 18% of households in Washington County do not have a home internet connection. WCFL branches have 88 public computers, in addition to printers, scanners, and more to help lessen the digital divide in Washington County.



EQUITABLE ACCESS TO GOVERNMENT SERVICES

The Washington County Free Library helps ensure equitable access to government services by offering passport application services, as well as providing a secure voting drop box. By bringing these essential civic resources into the library, community members—including those who may face transportation, financial, or accessibility barriers—can more easily participate in travel, elections, and other important aspects of civic life. These services reinforce the library's role as a trusted, accessible hub for information and community engagement.

MEETING ROOMS & STUDY SPACES

The Library's meeting and study rooms continue to serve as valuable resources for the community. Meeting rooms accommodate organizations, businesses, and civic groups, while study spaces offer individuals a quiet, private environment for work and collaboration. In the past year, library spaces hosted test proctoring, strategic planning sessions, tenant association meetings, public information sessions, team-building workshops, homeschool co-ops, interviews, and more.





ACCESS TO INFORMATION

Library staff work hard to meet a wide range of information needs for all community members quickly, efficiently, and compassionately. This year, staff answered 41,346 questions. That's 113 questions per day!

Community members visited WCFL's 20 premium digital services for accurate, trusted database results a total of 174,156 times, along with having access to an additional 12 state-sponsored and 14 non-paid digital resources.







PROGRAMS

The Washington County Free Library offers programming for all age groups. In FY25, WCFL continued to see an increase in adult program attendance. Staff members worked dilligently to offer engaging programs to meet the community's needs, scheduling them at convenient times and locations, to make participation easier for everyone. From job fairs to financial literacy workshops, from cheesemaking to clothing repair classes, and from escape rooms to genealogy research, we partner with community leaders to deliver new, relevant programs while continuing our longstanding successes.

The Library's Annual Fairytale Costume Gala supports these initiatives while raising awareness of library services and providing the community with an enchanting evening to explore the library transformed into a mystical realm of magical creatures, sorcery, and fantastical adventures. The event was sold out, and we look forward to reimagining it once again in the coming year.

EARLY CHILDHOOD LEARNING

WCFL has focused resources to help foster caregiver engagement and support childcare providers in early childhood learning.

Storytimes featuring crafts, songs, and activities create fun opportunities for children and caregivers to connect and participate together. Kids and teens discovered their love of reading through book clubs and writing contests, and their curiosity for STEM through hands-on experiments and building challenges.

ENHANCING EDUCATION

From book giveaways and author visits to hands-on maker activities, students of all ages can discover new interests and build their skills. Library staff are ready to help with homework and research for K–12 students and beyond.

Many WCPS middle and high school classes visited their local libraries for tours and to learn about resources accessible with their RAIL (Raising Access to Improve Literacy) student library cards.

WCFL PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

History Around the County

Washington County is full of cultural and historic significance. Branch libraries support their community's excitement for history by regularly creating programs featuring local historians and authors like *The Victory Gardens: Food in Hard Times* program that included extensive information about wartime gardens and even had historically accurate snacks to sample. Smithsburg library has success with their geneology research programs and their *Great Scientist* series for children.

Symphony Storytimes

WCFL presented musical storytimes, where a captivating book is paired with a fresh musical score performed by a Maryland Symphony Orchestra musician to create an unforgettable experience for all ages!

Hagerstown Homesteaders

Hagerstown Homesteaders, a very well-attended monthly gardening club, continues to grow, including an off-shoot teaching kids these important skills. From how to lay out garden plots, start seeds, and naturally control pests, to harvesting and canning, this club helps to prepare people for sustainable and healthy living.

Storytimes Around Town

Taking storytimes beyond the library's walls and into the community helps reach people where they are. The Williamsport Memorial Library hosted storytimes in the park, at a pizza parlor, a plant shop, the farmers market, and more—making it easier than ever for families to participate.



WORKSHOPS AND CLASSES

WCFL supports job seekers, entrepreneurs, and business owners through life skills workshops, financial and digital literacy classes, individualized job search assistance, and community partnerships that foster professional development and collaboration.

The Library fosters an interconnected community by incorporating multicultural and diverse perspectives into its programming, extending outreach to historically underserved populations, and partnering with organizations to build stronger community connections.

RESPONDING TO THE COMMUNITY

The Washington County Free Library strives to anticipate and respond to the community's evolving aspirations and needs, both current and future. We collect and analyze attendance data to guide the growth of our programs and services, ensuring they continue to reflect the interests and priorities of the communities we serve.

Bookmobiles build community engagement by serving as mobile community hubs. The Washington County Free Library continues its long-standing bookmobile legacy of meeting people where they are, by operating two modern vehicles that make an average of 60 stops each month. The newer, more compact bookmobile primarily visits community centers, retirement and adult-living communities, and senior centers, while the larger bookmobile bus serves schools, daycares, and summer camps.

WCFL PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Homeschool Book Club

WCFL engages our large and growing homeschool community by having resources throughout our locations, from homeschool and science kits, to learning and book clubs that meet regularly with devoted attendees in locations like Sharpsburg, Williamsport, Hancock, and Hagerstown.

Community Baby Showers

In collaboration with the Washington County Health Department, WCFL hosted 3 Community Baby Showers in Clear Spring, Hancock, and Williamsport. Expectant mothers played games, entered raffles, received important information on child rearing and safety, and left with diaper bags of useful goodies!

Writing & Design Contests

The library received 222 entries into the annual Writers and Poets Contest with triple the adult entries of last year! Author, Cerece Rennie Murphy, made a special visit! Contests like these showcase the talent and creativity of Washington County residents of all ages!

Summer Reading Club

Summer Reading Club helps prevent "summer slide" for students with a balance of self-paced reading goals and educational, fun, and enriching programs. Over 4,000 community members participated and we were honored to "Color Our World" with them for this year's theme! Events were held throughout all 8 locations and travelled with our two bookmobile's.


